We list below some of the targets to which the United Nations have committed for meeting this goal and to which we can contribute more, both from the position of citizens and entrepreneurs, either directly or through the exercise of our voting right:

- 1. Reduce all forms of violence, especially in inner circles.
- 2. Significantly reduce illicit financial and arms flows, strengthen the recovery and return of stolen assets and combat all forms of organized crime.
- 3. Significantly reduce corruption and bribery in all their forms.
- 4. Develop effective, accountable and transparent institutions at all levels.
- Ensure public access to information and protect fundamental freedoms, in accordance with national legislation and international agreements.
- 6. Promote and enforce nondiscriminatory laws and policies for sustainable development.





Among the institutions most affected by corruption are the judiciary and the police.

Corruption, bribery, theft and tax evasion cost some US \$1.26 billion for developing countries per year. This amount of money could be used to help those who are living on less than \$1.25 a day.

Approximately 28.5 million primary-schoolaged children who do not attend school live in areas affected by conflicts.

The proportion of non-convicted prisoners has remained almost constant over the last decade, at 31% of all prisoners.

The number of people who flee war, persecution and conflicts exceeded 70 million in 2018. This is the highest level seen by the UNHCR, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, in the last 70 years.

In 2019, the UN recorded 357 murders and 30 enforced disappearances of human rights defenders, journalists and trade unionists in 47 countries
